In 2017 the Rocky Mountain Conservatives, a Colorado-based 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, launched what's now called the "POC Capitol Interns" program. Through this program we have hired and placed ethnic-minority American college students from across the nation with U.S. House Representatives and Senators for seven-week internships in Washington D.C. each of the past three summers and are now recruiting for the summer of 2020.

America's political system is dividing voters by race, gender and wealth. For decades black/African-American voters have overwhelmingly identified with one party and voted for candidates from that party. The result being a flawed two-party system wherein one party tends to ignore this voting demographic, the other takes it for granted. This must change.

POC Capitol Interns program addresses the issue by attempting to bridge the divide between conservative legislators and young minority minds, thus benefitting both.

The goals of the program are two-fold: 1) Educate young people so that both parties respect and compete for the support of African-American citizens, 2) Introduce students to our system of self-governance by granting access that's typically out-of-reach or reserved for a privileged few. Black-Americans make up about 13% of the national population but only about 2% of the population on Capitol Hill. This program helps address that lack of balance both today and, hopefully, into the future as interns consider careers in public service.



Coming from all corners of the country, interns serve for seven weeks working on and around Capitol Hill. They attend congressional hearings, committee meetings and a variety of other functions while working directly with legislative members and chiefs of staff.



POCC Interns are housed in dorm rooms at George Washington University. An ideal location just a few stops on the Metro train from work/Capitol Hill and within walking distance of shopping and restaurant districts.

This relationship with GWU means mom and dad can rest assured that their intern children have a place to sleep every night that is safe and secure. Our on-site Group Coordinator serves as liaison, enforces reasonable curfews, arranges group excursions, including transportation logistics and more. Speaking of excursions....
